

Can you guess what that mantra might be?

It is Pastor Terpstra's refrain in his sermon on the morning of August 6th, 2023, my last Sunday as summer intern at Borculo. "HOLD FAST!" Pastor Terpstra pleaded on the basis of Hebrews 10:23. "Hold fast to Christ! Hold fast to Christ's word! Hold fast to Christ's people!"

It is difficult to devise a more fitting exhortation to the people of God in today's world and it is also the exhortation which I leave with you until we meet again.

Hold fast to Christ, Borculo CRC! It is in Him that all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge are stored (Col 2:3)! It is in Him that you will find every spiritual blessing corresponding to your every spiritual need (Eph 3:1). The couple has moved to the Upper Peninsula where Sam is attending Michigan Tech.







ARO SERVE PROJECT

On June 17, 2023, 28 people left BCRC to serve at Appalachia Reach Out in Inez, KY for a week. We arrived at ARO after supper on Saturday. We had a chance to check out the campus, unpack and relax after a long day of driving.

Sunday, we went to the Turkey Creek Church of the Nazrene. During the service, everyone from our group was called to the front of the church, and members of the congregation came forward, laid hands on us and prayed over us. It was a very moving moment that left most of us in tears. After the service, some ladies from the Turkey Creek Church made a wonderful meal for us. In the afternoon, we looked at some of the job sites and passed out flyers advertising the VBS program. At night, we enjoyed a meal the BCRC ladies prepared for us and met as a group to decide who would go to each site.

Some of the work that we did were: running a VBS program, cleaning apartments, showing love to a group of women at a women's and infant shelter and addiction recovery shelter for women, replacing a deck, doors and toilets, repairing floors, landscaping, organize the food pantry, painting and hanging new lights.

On Tuesday night, we worshiped at the Celebrate Recovery service. We served dinner to everyone who attended. We provided music for the group and celebrated with the people who were making a commitment to stop their addictions and those who asked the Lord to enter their lives. It was a very eye opening experience to see how many people were struggling with some type of addiction.

The rest of the week was spent working to accomplish all of the tasks put in front of us.

We would like to thank the congregation for their prayers and support of the serve project. We also want to thank the Wednesday night supper ladies for preparing wonderful food for us to take along. A special "thank you" to those who volunteered to serve on this project. You gave your time, talent, sweat & tears to make life better for the people in eastern Kentucky. We came home with a new appreciation for the blessings we have!

"I'm so thankful I was able to participate in the ARO mission trip! ARO is a well-organized operation with excellent staff in place to serve the people of Martin County. I went on this trip with a mindset to serve by "working" & "doing".....we did "work" and "do" but equally as important was "being" and "listening". Sometimes the work was simply listening and talking with a Martin County resident or praying for them which doesn't really seem like "work" at all! The many stories from the women at the White Oak Addiction Recovery Center seemed overwhelmingly sad and tragic to me! Those women have been through so much, yet their faith has either been newly found or reinforced through the recovery program. Please pray for the people at the ARC Centers that their faith will continue to grow and that they will be able to live a life free of addiction!

I also will not forget "Theo", who was a late arrival to VBS. His mom dropped him off and basically said, "He never sits, doesn't wear shoes and runs off....two people watched him at the last VBS" and she left. Within one minute of being with Theo, with my experience with special needs kids and challenging behaviors, I figured God had put me in that place at the moment, for that child. That was definitely a time of "work" and "doing" and not just "being" and "listening"! I am thankful I was finally able to join Borculo CRC on a mission trip and hope to be able to participate in another trip in the future!" Tanya Bosch

"The community there was different than at Borculo. There was more poverty, and there was a lack of employment opportunities for the families there. While we were there, I got to see the need that the families there had to deal with day to day, and the smiles from different persons when their needs were met when we lended a helping hand. The smiles on the kid's faces when they completed a project, and the energy with which they danced and played. All of those kids listened more and tried to pay more attention due to the situation they lived in, it would humble them and make every little thing mean so much to them. Helping a community like that does not only help them, but also helped us with our problems -- by helping them we would focus on their problems and leave our own behind or find the solution to them. Another thing that really inspired me was the amount of emotion and closeness in their churches, it made you feel special, like part of a really big family. That Sunday morning was probably one of the best Sundays I've ever experienced. I will always remember that even though they have so little, they still have a smile on their face, knowing that all that they need will be Christ. 
YOUTH GROUP – SUMMER 4H Activities

We can all be a little proud of our Borculo kids (not TOO much because we know Proverbs 16:18 says "Pride goes before destruction, and a haughty spirit before a fall."). Throughout the summer, many of our kids have jobs, train for sports, went on the ARO work project, work with 4-H animals for the fair, and help with chores at home.

These are all good training for growing into adulthood.

July 24 through 28, had many of our youth at the Ottawa Country fair to show a variety of animals. Some showed in 1 category while others were involved in up to 4. Animals range from chickens, rabbits, cats, dogs, to lambs, goats, dairy, and beef steers. It can be hard work. On any given day, you never know what the animal will do, so one that walks docilely for day after day at home, can have an adverse reaction at the fair and bring great frustration.

Some shows require normal dress attire, usually a nice shirt, jeans, and boots, while others might require a white lab coat, and still others a completely white outfit of jeans and shirt for showing in a dirt floor, shaving covered ring where your animal might headbutt you and leave a nice dirty mark. Kudos to moms and grandmas who have to get these outfits white again!



Often, as a parent, your 4 H years and the pledge sticks with you as you help your kids purchase, feed, and prepare their animals for show. That feeling doesn't seem to leave many parents, aunts, uncles, or maybe even grandparents. To that end, many of the individual animal classes have a chance at the end for Alumni showing. This is even more competitive and for some more serious business than the kids showing. Following the photos of the kids, you can find photos of some of these who still have 4 H competition living a bit in their hearts too.

For some, Saturday brings sadness and maybe even tears as those who raised market animals have to say Good bye, until next year when they begin again.

A few of the girls showed dairy cows and goats at Hudsonville Fair in August and had some time off from school to show their animals. There were many ribbons and trophies won at both fairs.

So, if you enjoy the fair, make sure you stop by next year to the barns, to the shows, or to fill your freezer at the sale. Congratulations to all of our hardworking kids at whatever they were involved with this summer.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH COMMITTEE REPORT

The Community Outreach Committee has been very busy again in the past year. In September, 2022, we had a Fall Kick-Off for the community to introduce the families to our upcoming classes and programs. It went so well, we did it again this year, this time on a Friday evening from 4 PM to 7PM on September 8th. Thank you to the many hands who made it a success again this year.

At the same time as the planning for the Fall Kick-Off last year, we were presented with a need in our community to help a single lady with home repairs. We worked on a Saturday morning, first with two other work groups, one from Haven CRC and one from Victory Point. We went to work on the exterior with a skid steer, a mini excavator, a large wood chipper and maybe 20 pairs of hands. The transformation was incredible! In one day from 8 AM to 6 PM, everyone worked but the job was not done. Victory Point sent guys to put a roof on the garage and to do needed repairs to the garage. Borculo's Tuesday night men's Bible Study came to paint the garage with paint donated by Repco Lite in Holland. As we were working there, we found she was living for the past four years without water or heat. We needed to get a little more help with funds and approached The Foundry for a donation. By the time the snow fell, we had a new furnace (thanks to Borculo CRC), a new well and pump, new plumbing throughout the house (thanks to Haven CRC). The Haven CRC Middle School youth group built a ramp, cleaned up the yard and planted flowers this summer. At the end of August, the Borculo CRC youth group came to do some additional painting and yard work. We can't start to name everyone that helped but know we appreciate you and so does our new friend. We had a "thank you" lunch at the house on September 9.

Throughout the year, we have been donating books to the Ottawa County Jail and getting to know Chaplain Aalderink better. The inmates really appreciate having a variety of reading material available to them. By now, we have donated about 50 bags of books, mostly to Ottawa County but some also to Allegan County. If anyone has books to donate, let one of the committee members know. If we can't use them for the jail, we can put them in the little free library by our playgroup in the back of the church parking lot. Thank you to Diane for expertly maintaining the library.

We had a joint meeting with the Christian Awareness Committee in the spring with the Chaplain from Tyson Foods to explore how we can work together with her for the needs of the workers there. At that meeting, we set plans to help in a multitude of ways, one of which is to provide emergency food for the new hires that don't have enough food to get them to their first paycheck. We have now blessed about a dozen people with needed supplies.

After that meeting, we set a coffee time with Chaplains Aalderink and Herrell, to see what could be done to fill both of their needs. From that meeting, we decided to include Pastor Willie in the circle and that has been amazing. We approached Zeeland Deaconate to ask for help getting a van for transporting the workers from Holland that don't or can't drive to their shift at Tyson. At this time, there is a 15 passenger van providing transportation to their jobs at Tyson. Chaplain Aalderink has helped some who have been released from jail to secure employment and transportation to jobs in the area.

Our newest avenues are Kids Hope USA and the GRO Pod at the Ottawa County Jail. Xiomara is willing to be one of the co-directors of Kids Hope but we would like someone to help her. We will also need some mentors. Training is provided and the school we will be working with is Robinson Elementary. Give our director a call if you want more info at 616-377-6274.

The GRO Pod (God's Redemptive Oasis) is just starting at the jail. We have approval from the Council to have Borculo CRC to become involved in this ministry. Chaplain Aalderink will speak more about this during our Mission Emphasis time.

What could you do for us? We need volunteers—when you see a request, please step up. Pastor Willie needs quarters for his people. We help him with laundry soap, hand soap, shampoo and deodorant as well as other items from the pantry. His people need to be clean when they leave for work. Help us keep the pantry stocked. If you see someone who has a need, help them out. You do not need to get approval from anyone. We do not give out money or gas cards. That is not our policy at all.

If you donate items to the Gateway Mission in Holland, please tell them you are from Borculo CRC. We are given gift cards based on donated goods. It is amazing how much we receive, but it is more amazing how, every time we have a need for items and use the cards, we get more immediately.

Please pray for our committee to have wisdom and the ability to do the work the Lord has put before us and that we do what He wants us to do, not just what we want to do.

Our Mission Emphasis this year will be September 24 and October 1. Here's what we are planning:



Our vision is to see girls around the world actively and enthusiastically expressing love for God and others—girls equipped, motivated and passionately engaged in living out their faith. Our mission is to bring girls everywhere into a living, dynamic relationship with Jesus Christ.





The Cadet theme for the 2023/2024 season is <u>CADETS—ROOTED</u> and <u>GROUNDED</u>. Our theme verse is: "So that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ." The Youth Group is ready for a new year after a great summer!



QUILTERS GROUP

On the second, fourth and fifth Tuesdays from September to May, you will find several ladies busy working on quilts in the church basement. I often wondered if others in the congregation really know what we are doing and what "making quilts" really means. Sure, we're cutting and sewing fabric, but there's really a whole lot

more involved that just that. So, here's a little info on what we're doing and what's involved in "making quilts".



First, our method: the quilts we make are made up of three layers. The top layer with the quilt design, the middle layer or filler, usually quilt batting or flannel and finally the backing. Oddly enough, we don't actually do any sewing at church—most of that is done in our homes. The completed top layer is brought back to church to have the filler and backing added. Then we attach them to the "sticks". These are long sticks, set on four horses, to which all the layers are attached, stretched across and fastened on all four sides. Then, we use a heavy crochet thread to stitch through all the layers, attaching them together. Once done, we remove the layers and the final finishing of the sides is done at home by one of our members.

Now that you know our method, here are more facts and interesting info about us.



#1. Did you know that every year, usually in December, we have donated between 75 to 80 quilts to various agencies.



#2. Did you know our list of donated agencies is growing? We have sent quilts to the Salvation Army, the Vets Home in Grand Rapids, to Degage Ministries in Grand Rapids, to ARO in Inez, KY, baby quilts to Positive Options in Holland and the Family Life Center in Allendale.

#3. Did you know that although we like to use batting or flannel as our filler, we occasionally get creative? Remember those old royal blue choir robes we had years ago? Whatever happened to them? We quilters know! A great deal of them were cut apart and ended up inside our quilts! If you ever wore one, you remember how warm they were. Yes, in true Dutch style, we repurposed them into quilt fillers.



Now that you know a bit more about us and what happens during our time at church, I will end with a request. If this is something you might be interested in, please come on a Tuesday afternoon. We don't care if you can sew or not! Those Tuesdays are all about standing around those sticks and joining the layers together. Anyone can do that. We have all the tools needed and are more than happy to explain the process. We hope to see you there.
